School Board Member Mitz Lee to Speak at May MMTC Meeting

School Board member Mitz Lee will be our featured speaker at the May 7, 2007 Mira Mesa Town Council meeting. She was invited to talk about current school district issues, and issues of importance to Mira Mesa. She will discuss three issues in particular:

- 1. Progress on resolving environmental issues associated with construction of Salk Elementary School. The Salk site was graded for school construction in 1980, but the School District did not proceed with construction of the school until passage of Proposition MM. Vernal pools now exist on the site, and the City and School District are working on a mitigation plan.
- 2. Social promotion policies.
- 3. Problems with the No Child Left Behind Act. In spite of exceptional academic performance, Wangenheim Middle School recently appeared on a list of schools "in need of improvement." This is one of an increasing number of cases in which good schools did not make their "Adequate Yearly Progress" goals due to bureaucratic reasons unrelated to academic performance.

Mitz Lee was elected to the San Diego Unified School District Board of Education in November 2004. In the past, she has served on the California State Testing and Reporting Performance Setting Panel for English/Language Arts and was a leader in San Diego City Schools' advisory groups including Parent Involvement Task Force and Citizens' Budget Advisory Committee. Born in the Republic of the Philippines, Mitz Lee became a U.S. citizen in 1988 and has lived in San Diego for 20 years. President's Message

The Mira Mesa Town Council Board is actively working to make the Town Council as effective an organization as possible. To accomplish this, we need to increase membership and participation in the Town Council. We have over 75,000 people in the Mira Mesa community, and so have the opportunity to increase membership substantially. The problem is that most people have a lot of demands on their time, and need some extra incentive to participate in MMTC meetings and functions. Historically, the most powerful incentive has been a really hot issue that brings out hundreds of angry people for a few meetings. A few of these people always remain and become active members after the fury dies down. This has been an effective, but painful, way to increase membership. A better method is for our current members to encourage their friends, neighbors and anyone else interested to attend an MMTC meeting. Our regular meetings provide an opportunity to hear from and interact with our elected officials and their representatives, the police and fire department, and our other community groups. Much of the information provided at these meetings is unavailable from other sources. Information about future public facilities and park and recreation projects is generally presented well in advance of construction, providing the opportunity for public input and review.

We are also working to identify community issues that MMTC can help to resolve. MMTC members are invited to submit issues that the Town Council should address. Issues and comments can be sent to a special email address set up for that purpose: issues@miramesatowncouncil.org, or you can call me at (858) 566-2261, or talk to any Board member. Because our elected officials or their representatives participate in MMTC meetings, we have developed good relationships that can be (and have been) very helpful in resolving community issues. This requires that the community is united about a solution. Elected officials generally will stay on the sidelines if the community is divided and wait for the community to resolve its own differences. The Town Council can be a good forum for accomplishing this.

May 14 is the deadline to apply for MMTC's College Scholarships for Community Service. Graduating high school seniors who live in Mira Mesa and have been involved with community service are invited to apply for the 2007 Mira Mesa Town Council's Verne Goodwin Scholarships. Natural Disaster Kit

Once again, fire season approaches, and San Diego experienced a minor earthquake on April 15. A natural disaster can occur at any time and in any place, but you can create a kit of supplies that will help your family to hold out in case of a disaster. The kit should contain the following items:

- First aid kit and first aid manual
- Flashlight and extra batteries (make sure the batteries are fully charged)
- Battery-operated radio
- Supply of prescription medicines (keep track of expiration date)
- Credit cards and cash
- Identification for each family member
- Extra set of car keys
- Matches in a waterproof container
- Signal flare
- Phone numbers and a map identifying safe places to go
- Special needs, such as diapers, formula, hearing aids, spare eyeglasses, etc.
- Three gallons of water per person
- Three-day supply of nonperishable food
- Kitchen tools (mechanical can opener, utensils, etc.)
- Complete change of clothes for each family member
- Tools and other accessories
- Sanitation- and other personal-hygiene products, such as toilet paper, soap, toothbrushes, and toothpaste
- Entertainment, such as games, books, compact discs/tapes with battery-operated player

This kit should be stored in a plastic tub, suitcase, or other container and put in an easily accessible place that you can get to in any emergency.



New Business

San Diego Hunger Coalition (Tia Anzellotti):

This is a countywide anti-hunger organization. The Food Stamp Program helps people with little or no income by providing them with an electronic card that can be used to purchase groceries. The amount of benefits received varies according to household income and number of people in the house. Currently, there are over 800,000 people in the county who could qualify, but only 26% are actually receiving this benefit. This is a federal program that is funded according to the level of participation. April is Food Stamp Awareness month. The SDHC hopes to increase awareness of this program by putting information in SDG&E bills and putting out flyers in both English and Spanish.

Meals on Wheels (Ruth Ann Michelson):

Meals on Wheels is a non-profit program that has been in existence for over 45 years and provides up to two meals a day, seven days a week, to seniors in need. Clients pay for the meals based on their ability. With over 100 daily routes, this program is in need of caring volunteers. Community Bible Church has allowed their parking lot to be used as a distribution point for Mira Mesa. Graffiti Ordinance Proposed by Councilman Maienschein

Councilmember Brian Majenschein announced his commitment to strengthen the City's laws on graffiti and to enact a zero tolerance policy of graffiti taggers. As Chair of the Public Safety and Neighborhood Services Committee, Maienschein will introduce the ordinance during this week's committee hearing. "We must treat graffiti as a crime, and not as an obnoxious act. Graffiti is a crime and a part of the gang culture. It also causes financial damages to law-abiding San Diegan's property. Tagging is a crime that is a natural progression for juveniles and young adults to get involved in gangs. This proposal will guarantee that every tagger will receive mandatory penalties and will focus on introducing juveniles and young adults to consequences from their actions," said Maieschein. Not only is graffiti a gang activity that often introduces teens to the gang culture, but it causes millions of dollars of property damage every year. The City spends more than one million dollars each year on graffiti abatement education and enforcement. This does not include the millions that other public agencies, utility companies, and victims of graffiti must pay to clean up their property. "Graffiti and gang activity often go hand-in-hand," said Maienschein. "From downtown San Diego to increased incidents of graffiti in Scripps Ranch, it is clear the City's current laws are not working. It is time to strengthen the law," Graffiti is also a crime that involves financial damages affecting law-abiding San Diegans. Instead of a strict zerotolerance policy on graffiti, the City's laws further penalize the victims of vandalism by requiring them to pay for the clean-up. The proposed ordinance will be voted on in the Public Safety and Neighborhood Services Committee as soon as possible.
