Some of you may know that the Planning Group is in the process of producing a new community Plan. Each of the more than forty communities in San Diego has such a plan. Since these community plans comprise an element of the San Diego General Plan, City Council approval is required for any changes.

The change process involves starting with a description of existing conditions, then section by section changes to the existing plan by the Planning Department with reviews by the Mira Mesa Community Planning Group.

San Diego's marijuana supply chain taking shape, but fierce battles under way for final slots

San Diego's local supply chain for its marijuana dispensaries is quickly taking shape, but approvals for indoor pot farms and edible factories are becoming more contentious as the city nears a cap it set of allowing 40 such businesses. The city has awarded permits to nearly 30 marijuana production facilities since August, setting up a fierce battle for the final wave of permits among 31 more applicants. Those not among the first 40 to be granted environmental exemptions and city approval hearings have begun trying to leapfrog the other businesses ahead of them in line by appealing their exemptions and preliminary approvals.

In addition, businesses located near some of the proposed facilities have begun protesting more vocally based on concerns about crime and safety, including a church in [Kearny Mesa](#) and tenants in an Otay Mesa Business Park.

Meanwhile, leaders of the local marijuana industry say they're hopeful the city might increase the number of marijuana production businesses it allows beyond 40. That would boost the local marijuana supply chain and increase the tax revenue the city generates from the emerging industry. In addition to sales tax, San Diego has a special marijuana tax of 5 percent that will increase to 8 percent in July. Prospects for lifting the cap may have improved with the Nov. 6 election, which shifted the San Diego City Council farther to the left politically. Most notably, Democrat Jen Campbell, a vocal supporter of marijuana legalization, defeated Republican Lorie Zapf, who successfully lobbied for a cap on dispensaries and voted against allowing a local supply chain.

San Diego officials want the 19 legal dispensaries they've approved to have an adequate local supply chain to eliminate the need to truck marijuana in from elsewhere and to prevent a local "black market" of marijuana producers. Unless the cap is lifted, local marijuana attorneys say, they expect the final wave of approvals to be marked by some fierce battles.

"There are a variety of appeals left, right and center," attorney Gina Austin said last week. "We are past the halfway point toward 40, so the hearings are starting to get more interesting." In addition to those appeals, nearby businesses have also been more vocal. Attorney Jessica McElfresh said that's partly because many of the marijuana production facilities in the first wave of approvals are located in ideal spots where no one would be inclined to appeal them.

But as city officials have moved on to proposed businesses with less ideal locations, the approvals have become more turbulent. Last month, an Otay Mesa business park association appealed the environmental exemption of a marijuana production facility proposed for 1555 Laurel Bay Lane, contending the businesses would be a bad fit. "The park was planned as an upscale, quiet group of small businesses with a professional image," association president Jaime Casano told the City Council. "The need for armed security at this business makes the neighbors nervous." Casano also said the city's approval process deprives nearby businesses of an opportunity to fight against such businesses until too late in the process.

Last week, dozens of congregants from Kairos Christian Church in Kearny Mesa unsuccessfully lobbied the city's hearing officer to reject a permit approval for a marijuana production facility at 7895 Convoy Court. They said they were concerned about odor, loitering and crime, noting that marijuana businesses are typically cash-only because the drug is still illegal under federal law, making most banks shy away.

McElfresh said concerns about security make no sense. "I think ironically, these business parks will actually be safer than before because these businesses have to have security guards," she said. "So congratulations business park, you have a free security guard and a free surveillance system." Loitering also seems unlikely, Austin said. While dispensaries sell products to individual consumers, indoor pot farms and edible factories deliver their products to buyers and don't have any customers coming or going from the site. McElfresh said she understands the concerns about odor, but she predicted it won't end up being a problem. "I do think that smell mitigation as a concern is legitimate and the operators need to make it a priority, and they will," she said. "It's been extensively discussed during city review."

Austin agreed, stressing that the marijuana businesses have a lot to lose if they violate their city permit by allowing smells to drift into business parks filled with dentists and other businesses. "If the smell is escaping because you aren't following the rules, that dentist is going to complain to the city and they will shut him down," Austin said. Austin said a good indicator of the impact of marijuana production facilities is a handful of the businesses that began operating a few years ago thanks to an unintended city loophole. "When you look at the ones that have been in operation, nobody even knows that they're there," she said. "These 'sky is falling' stories will play themselves out because we haven't seen that from the ones that are up and running under the old system."

Those businesses were allowed to continue operating for two years when the city voted to allow a legal supply chain shortly after state voters legalized recreational marijuana in November 2016. Some of them can't obtain a city permit to continue past the two-year mark because they don't meet zoning requirements or city regulations barring dispensaries from being within 100 feet of housing or 1,000 feet of sensitive land uses like parks, churches, schools and youth-oriented facilities.

What Are Waste-Related Violations and How Can I Report Them?

There are many reasons that citizens contact the City's Environmental Services Department Solid Waste Code Enforcement Division. To report any of the following problems, please use the City of San Diego's Get It Done app (hyperlinks provided below) or contact the Environmental Services Department at 858-694-7000 Monday through Friday from 6:30 a.m. to 5 p.m.

- Waste and litter on private property (trash, junk, debris scattered on occupied or unoccupied properties)
- [Waste and litter on City property](#) (trash and debris on undeveloped rights of way or on City-owned land)
- No lids on dumpsters and/or trash cans
- Overflowing dumpsters, recycling bins/boxes and trash cans
- [Scavenging of trash or recycling containers](#) is illegal and can be reported by using the City's Get It Done feature
- [Trash containers left in the public rights-of-way beyond collection hours](#) (Cans may be placed at collection point after 6 p.m., the day before collection, and must be removed by 6 p.m., the day of collection; except for the downtown central traffic district)
- [Dumpsters encroaching on the public rights-of-way](#) (encroaching sidewalks, parkways, streets or alleys)
- Wooden newspaper recycling boxes on public rights-of-way (wooden boxes, generally with no ID which have been illegally placed on public rights of way)
- Unattended shopping carts, personal belongings and waste on public rights of way
- Waste haulers collecting in residential areas prior to 6 a.m., non-licensed haulers collecting in City limits, damaged dumpsters, un covered loads.
- Recycling contamination (recycling containers filled with trash/unacceptable recyclable items)

Abandoned Vehicle Abatement!!!

In the City of San Diego, it is illegal to leave an operable or inoperable vehicle parked for more than 72 consecutive hours without being driven at least 1/10th of a mile on a public street. It is also illegal to park any abandoned, wrecked, dismantled or inoperable vehicle on private property in public view.

Hornets Defense Creates a Buzz in Convincing Win!!!

Before the San Diego Section Division II title game, a Lincoln assistant coach said the game would come down to the speed of the Hornets defense against a high school version of former Virginia Tech and Atlanta Falcons great Michael Vick.

Chalk one up to speed as the Lincoln defense stopped [Mira Mesa](#) quarterback Noah Tumblin at every turn, limiting the Marauders offense to 89 yards as the Hornets defeated Mira Mesa 23-3 before a crowd of more than 5,500 at Southwestern College to claim the title and advance to the Southern California Regionals.

This is Lincoln's first section title since 2012 and its ninth overall. Mira Mesa has never won a section championship.

"The game plan was to go get him," said Lincoln senior strong safety Emmanuel Okere. "Blitz and contain."

"It was a matter of heart. We wanted it more than they did."

Mira Mesa had 13 possessions in the game, 11 starting in Lincoln territory. But the Hornets defense — led by Trequan Catlin, Okere, T'Ray Kirkland and Joseph Morales — held firm every time. However, no defensive play was bigger than Akili Butler's stop of Albert Lemon on a fake punt midway through the fourth quarter. After a measurement, Lemon was inches short of a drive-sustaining first down.

No. 5-seeded Lincoln (10-4) took possession at the Mira Mesa 24. Okere's run put the ball inside the 10 and Carlito Nothaft scored from a yard out to put the game out of reach. "We had to hit him hard and stay outside," said Butler. "I wasn't concerned with his speed. We did it. It means a lot for this whole community to win it all."

Tumblin, who came into the game with 2,818 yards total offense, 999 of those rushing, was sacked four times and Patrick White intercepted an ill-advised throw into the end zone in the first half.

Of Mira Mesa's first 21 plays, seven went for zero or minus yards.

No. 7 Mira Mesa (10-3) didn't get a first down in the second half until 3:20 remained to play. The Marauders took possession at the Lincoln 45, 20, 31, 26, 37, 27, 36, 28, 35, 13 and 43, yet could produce just three points.

Tumblin completed 5-of-15 passes for 47 yards. He carried 18 times for minus-38 yards.

"Everybody underestimates our defense," said Lincoln coach David Dunn. "We have very good team speed. They never get any credit."

Offensively, Lincoln had 256 total yards — 136 passing.

Quarterback Chris Davila completed 6-of-13 passes for 114 yards.

Mira Mesa came into the game averaging 34.7 points, Lincoln 35.6.

The Marauders and Hornets both came into the game averaging nearly 400 yards total offense.

Earlier this week, Don Chapman — Lincoln's do-all defender — de-committed from Colorado after coach Mike MacIntyre was fired amid a 5-6 season and a six-game losing streak.

Recruiting services have Arizona, [Colorado State](#), Fresno State and Washington State among the frontrunners for his services.

The really important element of this project for every person in Mira Mesa is Seed Park. This is a brand new 25-acre park that is part of the 3Roots project. You can see the draft plan for the park, which has been approved by both the Mira Mesa Recreation Council and Planning Group, on the 3Roots Website. I strongly recommend that everyone visit that website.

Others are in the process of getting their city permits, which, in most cases, would allow them to expand. Most of the proposed businesses are located in [Mira Mesa](#), [Kearny Mesa](#) and Otay Mesa, with a handful in other neighborhoods that have the necessary light industrial zoning.

There are many more properties in those areas where marijuana production facilities could meet the city's zoning and land-use regulations, but the cap will prevent additional facilities from opening.
